

To commemorate the historic Quaker and African American cemeteries 1807-1890

In August 2018, descendants and volunteers working to protect the cemeteries at Walter Pierce Park asked the DC Department of Parks \& Recreation and Department of General Services to create a commemorative space to honor the 8,428 people buried at the site, proposing an "Ancestors Pavilion." The descendants and their supporters agreed that:

- the Pavilion should send a message of resilience, respect, healing, and benevolence;
- there should be no disturbance of the land in creating the space;
- the names, ages, and years of death of the buried would be listed on nine signs along an existing centrally located wall, facing Adams Mill Road;
- the signs would tell the story of the site, the people, and the park;
- the bricks in front of the wall should be re-laid to incorporate a millstone motif to honor the miller who founded the Quaker cemetery;
- park entry signs should read "Walter Pierce Park - Site of Historic African American and Quaker Cemeteries"
- The Pavilion should be an accessible space for readings, performances, contemplation, and rejuvenation. It should be a space for the living!

## WALTER PIERCE PARK IS A NATIONAL UNDERGROUND RAILROAD NETWORK TO FREEDOM SITE because many people buried here resisted slavery and helped others become free.

THE COLORED UNION BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION, which owned and operated Mt. Pleasant Plains Cemetery, was deeply involved in the largest Underground Railroad escape attempt in American history: the Pearl Affair.

In April 1848, 77 enslaved Washingtonians secretly boarded the schooner Pearl near the $7^{\text {th }}$ Street wharf, setting sail for freedom. Many Association members had family and friends on board. Some assisted the escape. But the Pearl was captured by angry slaveholders at the mouth of the Potomac as it was about to enter Chesapeake Bay.

Two Pearl passengers-RICHARD EDMONSON and EPHRAIM EDMONSON--were buried at Mt. Pleasant Plains Cemetery, as was their mother AMELIA EDMONSON. Six of Amelia's 13 children tried to escape slavery on the Pearl. When the operation failed, AMELIA and her husband PAUL became outspoken anti-slavery activists. Their son-in-law JOHN H. BRENT aided the escape. LUKE CARTER, also buried here, hid Pearl passengers in his West End home before the escape.

OTHER UNDERGROUND RAILROAD HEROES BURIED HERE: CHARLES H. BROWN raised money to free enslaved people. DENNIS MAGRUDER fled slavery in Maryland when British forces invaded in 1814. LEWIS FERGUSON, WILLIAM TOLSON, and EDWARD MARKS ran away from slavery to join the U.S. Colored troops in the Civil War. DABNEY and LUCY WALKER crossed into Union lines near Fredericksburg, Virginia, to scout and spy for the U.S. forces. COUNTLESS SELF-EMANCIPATED CIVIL WAR REFUGEES are buried here, undertaking dangerous risks to live free in Washington.

UNDERGROUND RAILROAD NETWORK TO FREEDOM

WALTER PIERCE PARK es una National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom sitio porque muchas personas enterradas aquí resistieron la esclavitud y ayudaron a otros a ser Hibres.

La Asociación de los Colores de la Unión Benevolente, que poseia y operaba el cementerio Mt. Pleasant Plains, estaba profundamente involucrado en el mayor intento de fuga de ferrocarril subterráneo en la historia americana: el asunto Pearl.

En abril de 1848, 77 los esclavizados Washingtonianos abordaron secretamente la goleta Pearl cerca del $7^{\text {TH }}$ Street wharf, zarpando hacia la libertad. Muchos miembros de la Asociación tenían familiares y amigos a bordo. Algunos ayudaron a escapar. Pero el Pearl fue capturado por los esclavistas furiosos en la desembocadura del Potomac, ya que estaba a punto de entrar en la bahía de Chesapeake.

Los pasajeros de Pearl-Richard Edmonson y Ephraim Edmonson-fueron enterrados en el cementerio Mt. Pleasant Plains, aligualque la madre de la heredera Amelia Edmonson. Seis de los 13 hijos de Amelia trataron de escapar de la esclavitud en la Pearl. Cuando la operación fracasó, AMELIA y su esposo PAUL se convirtieron en activistas anti-esclavistas. Su yerno, John H. Brent, ayudó a escapar. Luke Carter, también enterrado aquí, escondió Pearl los pasajeros en su casa de West Endantes de la escapar.

OTROS HEROES SUBTERRANEOS DEL FERROCARRIL ENTERRADOS aquí: CHARLES H. BROWN recaudó dinero para liberar a la gente esclavizada. DENNIS MAGRUDER huyó de la esclavitud en Maryland cuando las fuerzas británicas invadieron en 1814. LEWIS FERGUSON, WILLIAM TOLSON y EDWARD MARKS huyeron de la esclavitud para unirse a las tropas de color de Estados Unidosen el la guerra Civil. DABNEY y LUCY WALKER cruzaron las líneas de Unión cerca de Fredericksburg, Virginia, para explorar y espiar a las fuerzas estadounidenses. INNUMERABLES REFUGIADOS de la guerra Civil auto-emancipado son enterrados sue, emprendiendo los riesgos más peligrosos para vivir gratis en Washington.

## ARCHAEOLOGY IN ADAMS MORGAN: SURVEYING THE WALTER PIERCE PARK CEMETERIES, 2005-2013

FROM 2005 TO 2013, HOWARD UNIVERSITY
ARCHAEOLOGISTS conducted a survey of the Walter Pierce Park cemeteries at the request of the Adams Morgan community Their goal: to identify where vulnerable graves from the African American and Quaker cemeteries might still exist.

The survey involved NO DIGGING so that no graves would be disturbed. Examining the surface of the site, the archaeologists found the exposed remains of at least nine individuals, coffin hardware, grave offerings, and other cemetery features.

The survey was led by biological anthropologist Mark Mack of Howard University, a leading expert on African American burial

In 2013, a geophysical survey of the park found intact graves, although the topography of the site has changed over time due to human-made disruptions. The scientists determined that hundreds-or possibly thousands-of graves remain in the park. Today, any work in the park requires archaeological monitoring so that no graves are disturbed.

## ARQUEOLOGIA EN ADAMS MORGAN: ENCUESTA DE LOS CEMENTERIOS <br> DE WALTER PIERCE PARK, 2005-2013

DE 2005 A 2013, HOWARD UNIVERSITY ARCHAEOLOGISTS, Hevó a cabo una encuesta de los cementerios de Walter Pierce Park a petición de la comunidad Adams Morgan. Su objetivo: identificar dónde podrian existir tumbas vulnerables de los cementerios afroamericanos y cuáqueros.

La encuesta implicó NO DIGGING para que no se molestaran las tumbas. Examinando la superficie del sitio, los arqueólogos encontraron los restos expuestos de al menos nueve individuos, herrajes de ataúdes, ofrendas de tumbas y otras caracteristicas del cementerio.

La encuesta fue dirigida por el antropólogo biológico Mark Mack de la Universidad Howard, un experto líder en sitios de entierro afroamericanos. El profesor Mack fue el director de laboratorio del African Burial Ground en Nueva York antes de su prematura muerte en 2012.

En 2013, un estudio geofisico del parque encontró tumbas intactas, aunque la topografia del sitio ha cambiado con el tiempo debido a interrupciones hechas por el ser humano. Los científicos determinaron que cientos, o posiblemente miles de tumbas permanecen en el parque. Hoy en día, cualquier trabajo en el parque requiere monitoreo arqueológico para que no se molesten las tumbas.
